Jinda organization - A Center for Ezidi Women and Girls

The Jinda center opened in July 2015 as a long-term response to the overwhelming needs of women and girls who have escaped or been rescued from Daesh (ISIS) captivity. When they arrived in the Dohuk area, these women and girls, are in urgent need of care. It is important to understand that many (if not most) have suffered extreme violence, torture, beatings, forced conversion to Islam, sexual violence, captivity, and being sold as slaves.

The center follows up on the work of the Mobile Teams by offering an inviting and pleasant (all woman) space where groups are offered in depth counseling treatment, vocational courses such as crafting, knitting and sewing, agricultural skills, social activities, and most of all a safe space where they can share their experiences without judgement. In Kurdish 'Jinda' means new life, and that is what the center stands for, a place to regain strength, and hope, and start new chapters in their lives. With the knowledge they gain from different vocational courses, the goal is that they can provide for themselves and their families financially, and feel proud of their accomplishments. Jinda became a civil society NGO in 2015.

"When they first arrived, they were collapsed, totally. Psychologically, health-wise — everything, step by step, we are reintegrating them into society." Cheman Rashid Jinda Director Reported.

Jinda Mission:


Our mission is to raise awareness, represent and rehabilitate survivors affected by wars and to seek the implementation of human rights principles to create a society where men and women are treated equally.

NUMBER OF IDPS AND REFUGEES HOSTED BY KURDISTAN REGION OF IRAQ FOR 2023

As of December 2023. The Kurdistan Regional Government Department of Media and Information has released the latest statistics of the Immigration and Displacement.

The Kurdistan Region hosts 900,467 displaced individuals, comprising:

- 631,174 internally displaced persons (IDPs).
- 269,293 refugees, with specifics as follows:
- 251,475 from Syria.
- 7,796 from Turkey.
- 8,357 from Iran.
- 652 from Palestine.
- 1,013 from other locations.

Among the refugees and IDPs, 30% reside in camps, while the remaining 70% have integrated into communities outside these facilities.

- An estimated 110,000 Iraqi families, identified as IDPs, live across 33 camps within the main governorates: Erbil (41%), Duhok (40%), and Slemani (19%).
- As of December 2023, 4,041 displaced individuals have returned to their home countries, including 1,944 IDPs and 2,097 refugees.




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EMPOWERING WOMEN IN CONFLICT PREVENTION AND RESPONSE STRATEGIES FUNDED BY UN-WOMEN AND WPHF PROJECT

Location: Iraq Kurdistan, Northern Iraq. Duhok and Al-Hamdaniya District (Khazer M1 IDP camp)

project took place in the form of skills-building workshops designed to increase women's capacity, confidence and willingness to participate in decision-making and public roles. The target group of the project are marginalized women, based in the two different locations. Each location offers one (1) course with 15 participants twice (2) a week for the duration of six (6) months. Every two (2) months a new group of participants starts the workshops, which makes a total of 90 female participants directly benefitting from the project.

Participation is based on expression of interests and voluntary basis. We organize workshops in which participants learn essential skills such as communication, negotiation, public speaking and problem solving which will enhance and promote their capacity, confidence and willingness to participate in decision-making and public roles. O

Our project aims to increase coordination and communication among women to discuss, support and learn from and with each other and to promote the role of women in public roles. In 2023, our project created two councils of qualified women who have participated in the workshops. Subsequently, these councils provided women with a platform through which they express their concerns and issues, which in turn the councils communicate and coordinate to other relevant stakeholders such as local authorities and service providers.

Moreover, the councils also set out to promote the role of women in decision making, increase visibility of women in public roles and provide access for women to essential services. In creating these councils, we formalize and institutionalize gender balanced representation structures that will continuously seek to promote the role and visibility of women in decision making.

Through the period of one year 2022- 2023 Women's Council members (12) and volunteers (6) participated in the over 100 stakeholder visits with decision-makers to discuss issues, challenges, and protection concerns, and collaborate on mitigation and alleviation strategies. In addition to ongoing relationships with camp managements and council members to ensure that protection concerns are raised with camp Management in a timely manner and responded to efficiently and effectively. Besides good coordination has been built between committee members and stakeholders in Erbil and Dohuk.

101 meetings have been conducted with stakeholders where gender was the main focus of these discussions. The women's committees rose the issues that women experiencing in the community. This resulted in gendersensitive and gender-aware responses to these issues. A strong example includes different men and women food distribution days within the camp, women being supported with financial contributions when they return to their places of origin to support their financial independence from men, women being granted access to DCVAW (Directorate of Combating Violence Against Women) services, including mobile teams even though they fall outside of DCVAW's geographic area of operations. In addition to delivering important messages to the media through 567 posts regarding gender issues by the women's committees. We are happy that even the project has come to an end, the women committee is one of the biggest success of the project with its sustainable impact that the NGO is proud of that created a sustainable committee with its ongoing coordination through other projects of Jinda.

WE FIX IT FUNDED BY MC MC ORG

Location: Iraq Kurdistan, Northern Iraq. Duhok khanki and Sharya Camps

Project description and objectives:

For the Second year in row we are glad that our partners from Italy MC MC organization who have supported us with WE Salon last year have supported us again in implementing another project with a new idea to support women independence and gender equality.

The project is designed for women in camps which offered training in mobile maintenance and programming, which can provide new employment opportunities and enhance their self-sufficiency. The project also focus on economic activities that help women generate income, fostering economic independence and improving their living conditions. By entering fields traditionally dominated by men, women can challenge and change societal stereotypes about gender roles.

Jinda organization gave the opportunity to twenty four women and girls to learn the skills of mobile maintenance and programming. The trainer Designed a curriculum that coverd basic to advanced levels of mobile maintenance and programming for duration of 32 days, tailored to the participants' learning pace and educational background. This new skill have been requested by the girls from khanki and Sharya IDPS camps. Mobile Maintenance shops have not been opened by women before because it is believed that its traditionally dominated by men.

We make sure the project is sustainable by offering the participants with toolboxes that help them with (Hands-On Practice) to access to their own tools, graduates can immediately start practicing and applying what they've learned, reinforcing their skills. Professional Start. We provide the essential equipment needed to start working on mobile maintenance tasks right away.

Its worth to mention that through this project we were able to support six women graduated as the best in class with no income with setting up two mobile maintenance and programming shops in khanki and sharya Internal displaced camps to be run by them as the first mobile maintenance and programming shops opened and run by women in Dohuk governorate. The project have different impacts including:

- Economic Empowerment
- Skill Utilization and Development
- Increased Confidence and Independence
- Social Empowerment
- Improved Quality of Life

Income Generation by Equipping with toolkits, 24 women can start offering mobile repair services, generating income for themselves and their families. The six women running the two shops will have an opportunity to operate their own businesses, potentially earning more substantial and stable incomes.

Jinda also offered marketing & business management training for one day. The majority of women including 18 of them have participated in the course which was held In Dohuk. This course have been held as an international women's day activity to equip participants with essential business skills. Enhance financial literacy and management capabilities, Fostering entrepreneurial thinking and problem-solving, and Preparing participants to manage and grow their businesses sustainably.

RECYCLING PLASTIC BY WADI, SHRED UP, AND BMZ PROJECT

Location : Kabarto 1 & 2 Camps Beneficiaries: IDPs from Shingal

Project Summary: This project started as a pilot in August 2022 until March 2023 due to the high level of waste especially in the camps and its effects on the people living in such environment where diseases can easily transfer and effects the health of the camp community. Many cleaning campaigns have been taken before but with only short period of a time the camp is again polluted with all kinds of waste.

In April 2023, we officially started with implementing the project by opening a recycling center in Kabarto camp with hiring of 6 girls from the camp community of kabarto 1 and 2 camps along with one technician. The project Generate employment opportunities for girls through involvement in awareness-raising campaigns and operational roles at the recycling center.

The recycling center serves as a focal point for plastic waste management activities. It is equipped with compress, shredder and milling machines to process various types of plastic waste effectively. Trained staff, including local girls, are overseeing daily operations, ensuring efficient collection, segregation, and recycling of plastic materials. The team organize regular awareness-raising seminars, and educational sessions within the camp. These sessions are covering topics such as the detrimental effects of plastic pollution on the environment and human health, the importance of recycling, and practical tips for waste reduction. The project team have been trained by Jinda Project management staff and Halabja Recycling Center staff.

Suaad one of the camp residents reported "I never realized the impact of our everyday actions until we started collecting plastic. Now, seeing the mountains of plastic waste shrink as we recycle gives me hope that we can make a difference in our environment."

a series of seminars and awareness sessions have been conducted to educate residents about the importance of plastic collection and recycling. These initiatives aim to foster a sustainable environment and empower the community to take active roles in waste management.

As a result, each month we noticed the Higher participation rates in plastic collection and recycling activities. Enhanced community spirit and cooperation in maintaining a cleaner camp environment and development of new skills and potential economic opportunities for residents involved in the recycling process.

Our future objectives focus on expanding operations, increasing community involvement, and generating economic benefits through the production of recycled products. Continue and expand seminars and workshops to keep the community informed about the latest recycling practices and environmental issues. Integrate recycling education into local schools to instill environmental values in younger generations.

The success of this initiative relies on collaboration with local authorities (Camp Managements of both kabarto 1 and 2), NGOs, and media including Kanal 4, NRT, VOA, RUDAW, ALHURAA, ALsharqya, War TV, Duhok TV and Khane). We are grateful for the support and contributions of our partners, who share our vision of creating a cleaner, greener future for the camp and its residents.

BETTER LIFE FOR WOMEN AND GIRLS AND THEIR CHILDREN

Project Duration: June 2023 - Dec 2023

Beneficiaries: IDPs

Project description and objectives: Crpsspoint Europe works with the Jinda Center in response to the Daesh attack on the Yazidi people in August 2014. More than 350,000 Yazidis have fled to the Kurdish region of northern Iraq. Yazidi girls, women and their children reside in six camps in Duhok region (Kabarto 1, Kabarto 2, Shraya, Esyan, Rawanga and Khanke camps) in northern Iraq are the marginalized group as a result of hostilities in this region.

The project is dedicated to help the internally displaced Yazidi girls and young women and their children in Iraq, who experienced kidnapping, enslavement and sexual abuse and had to cope with severe traumas. General objective is to improve the quality of the life of Yezidi girls, women, and children, including orphan children by providing adequate services with medical, psychological and education support. Besides, the project strives to empower and encourage women with vocational trainings as well as various linkages with effective job opportunities in a wide range of functional areas.

This project aims to empower women and children by providing vocational courses, STEM education, English, and computer courses. By equipping them with essential skills and knowledge, we aspire to create sustainable livelihoods, improve their socio-economic status, and foster a better quality of life.

Project Objectives:

- 1. Empowerment through Education: To provide vocational training courses tailored to the needs of women and children, including specific programs for Yazidi children.
- 2. Economic Independence: To enable women to generate their own income and improve their family's financial stability.
- 3. Improved Quality of Life: To enhance the overall well-being of women and children through skill development and support services.

With the support of Crosspoint Europe we were able to open tailoring and Upcycling of clothes courses. The tailoring course aims to equip women with the skills and knowledge necessary to become proficient in sewing and tailoring. This course is designed to empower women to start their own tailoring businesses, secure employment in the garment industry, and achieve economic independence. The upcycling of clothes course for women is an innovative initiative to empower women with valuable skills, environmental sustainability. promote and enhance independence. By providing comprehensive training and support, this course aims to create sustainable livelihoods and improve the quality of life for women and their families, while also contributing positively to environmental conservation.

As for children, English and computer courses have been opened for children in Dohuk and IDPs camps. English and computer courses provide children with critical skills that enhance their communication abilities, academic performance, and future career prospects. These courses not only prepare children for a competitive job market but also foster cognitive development, creativity, and independence. Investing in English and computer education is essential for equipping children with the tools they need to succeed in an increasingly interconnected and digital world.

COMMUNITY AWARENESS TO REACH A SOCIETY FREE OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN FUNDED BY CORDAID

Project Duration: Feb 2023 – Aug 2023 Beneficiaries: IDPs and Host community

Throughout the Iraq and KRI, Gender-Based Violence (GBV) victims, implementing local authorities and religious and tribal leaders lack the sufficient knowledge regarding the rape and harassment laws. GBV victims struggle to reengage in the community activities which mean that many of them have the chance to be isolated and lack the access to the necessary mental tools. Jinda and Qobahan Organizations conducted (18 of training sessions) in Duhok Governorate in alliance with I-NAP 1325 Participation, Protection and Prevention Pillars.

Jinda and Qobahan Organizations conducted trainings for women leaders to enhance their communication skills and GBV based-knowledge to better participate in decision making process on local and national level. This will lead to enhance the current legislations and provide better scope for victims of violence to participate in peace and decision making. we conducted several awareness sessions and brought victims of violence, women leaders, religious and tribal leaders, and relevant security forces representatives to review the current GBV legislations and amend them accordingly to align with international human rights and women's rights.

Additionally, we conducted digital security training for young men and women on how to better protect themselves online from being harassed from predators. We also conducted security session on how to use two authentication layers to increase their social media account security.

On July 30th and 31st, two days conference have been conducted on establishing the "Duhok Women's Network for Peace and Development" As agreed by the CSO's joined this network. the newly established network involve 16 CSOs working in the field of empowering of women in decision making and the promotion of the Women, Peace and security agenda (1325 resolution) in Dohuk city. Through this network, we will work on promoting peace, equality, and sustainable development for Women in Dohuk City.

These experiences increased the women's confidence, sense-of-self and mental health and wellbeing, with council members reporting they are now confident in speaking with people from different backgrounds and of different ages, they trust themselves, have more confidence in facing challenges and feel more courageous

CARAVAN OF HUMANITY SUPPORT

Project Duration: May 2023 - on going

Beneficiaries: IDPs, Refugees and Host community

In 2023, we were delighted for the start of the new collaboration with Caravan of Humanity NGO. caravan of humanity is an austrian NGO which collects Aid to support people in need globally. Together we achieved a lot on site: A total of 12.9 tons of donations in kind were collected and transported by truck across Europe to the Middle East.

Caravan of humanity 12 aid team came to the north of Iraq and coordinated with us to distribute the donations in kind – ranging from clothing, toys and school materials to sewing machines and bicycles – directly to the local population. The distribution of aid covered different areas and camps in Dohuk, Zakho and surrounding villages. Focusing on all orphanages in the area including Juveen Orphanage which hosts about 150 orphans most who lost their parents in the attack of Isis on Shingal 2014. Also the two other orphanages in Dohuk and Zakho. In addition to the aid projects specifically for traumatized girls and young women were supported through Jinda programs.

A special characteristic of caravan of humanity association is that – in addition to the distribution of donations in kind and financial support of the projects on site – especially the "meeting at eye level" is the focus of helping. The aim is to create a feeling of solidarity between the helpers and the refugees. Therefore, the caravan of humanity relief team was accompanied by clowns and the so-called "mobile painting room". These artists are very important for the encounters with the children: because they are true heart-openers and manage to enchant their young audience in no time. This suddenly turns a clown show into a place of hugging, shared wonder and joyful music-making. The "mobile painting room", on the other hand, is a place for "introspection" and provides space for "colorful" thoughts: when painting, feelings can be expressed without words and thus usually more directly. Whether meeting the clowns or painting – it is certain that through these happy encounters the children forget their difficult everyday life and can, at least for a short time, just be a child.

Vocational courses for Women

With the financial support and materials (sewing machines and fabrics) donated by Caravan of Humanity we were able to open tailoring and upcycling of clothes training for thirty women from the IDPs camps and surrounding areas. Training women in tailoring and upcycling of clothes offers numerous benefits, including economic, social, and environmental advantages.

Women can earn a livelihood by offering tailoring services, creating bespoke clothing, or selling upcycled products. Skills in tailoring and upcycling can enable women to start their own businesses, fostering entrepreneurship. Women acquired valuable skills that can be passed on to future generations, promoting continuous learning. and not to forget the benefits of Upcycling clothes which helps reduce textile waste, contributing to a more sustainable environment. For women in camps or vulnerable situations, these skills offer a practical and immediate way to improve their living conditions and support their families.

We also celebrated two important international celebrations with the help of Caravan of Humanity including International Children's day by organizing some fun activities for about 300 children in Domiz refugees camp. And opening of an exhibition for women entrepreneurs in Dohuk as an activity for 16 days of activism against Gender Based Violence. Our Program with Caravan of Humanity will continue to 2024.

Capacity Building of Staff

We are proud that three yazidi ladies from Esyan IDPs camps whom have attended our art class are now famous with her art work and showcased her art in the exhibition.







The idea of this impactful exhibition did not only support women in business but also raised awareness about the importance of gender equality and women's empowerment. The exhibition was held with the presence of Dr.Khanzad the secretary general of High Women council in Directorate of Youth In Duhok Governorate. Special thanks to High Women Council and Caravan of Humanity for funding this event.

Celebrating World Children's Day 1st June

On 1st June 2023 we celebrated Children's Day in Khanki camp with a special event aimed at bringing joy and laughter to the children. The event featured two individuals dressed as animals, creating a fun and engaging atmosphere that delighted the young attendees. The event have been attended by 300 kids and organized in partnership with other local and international NGOs with the coordination of Khanki camp managment.

Media and TV

Our NGO address's various global challenges, from poverty and healthcare to environmental conservation and human rights addressing the challenges and efforts of our NGO to the community. During 2023, We were hosted many times by Local TV and Radio stations including Dijlah, KNN, , Alhurra, Alsharqya Along with press interviews including VOA voice of Americans and Kerkuk Now.

2023 Christmas

In the spirit of Christmas and with a commitment to supporting the community, our NGO undertook a special initiative to distribute Christmas food baskets and school bags to the children of Algosh District by providing 240 kids with essential items such as candies, gloves, scarf, socks, copybook, pen, toys, water bottle, school bag and stickers. Additionally, the initiative aimed to foster a sense of community spirit and solidarity among the residents of the district. The distribution have been done on Friday in church where the kids were attending some religious class. In addition to distributing 50 Christmas baskets for widows in Algosh who most of them lost their husbands in the war against ISIS. The food basket included the essential needs for baking the famous Christmas desert (Kulicha) the basket included: butter, flour, dates, coconut, nuts, and candies

PAVING THE WAY FOR WOMEN ENTREPRENEURS IN KHANKI CAMP

Hanan khithr a resilient Yazidi woman from Khanki, had faced numerous challenges throughout her life. Displaced by conflict and forced to live in a camp, Hanan struggled to find stability and hope for a better future. However, her determination and the support of her community would eventually lead her to a remarkable transformation.

In 2023 Hanan attended one of our vocational courses aimed at providing practical skills and empowering women, included training in mobile phone maintenance – a skill not traditionally associated with women in the camp. Hanan showed remarkable aptitude and enthusiasm for the subject. Her dedication and hard work did not go unnoticed. Upon completing the course, she received the keys of a mobile maintenance shop fully equipped with tools prepared by our NGO and funded by MC MC org.

Hanan became the first woman in Khanki camp to own and operate a business. Her mobile maintenance shop quickly became a vital service for the camp's residents, providing affordable and reliable repairs. Hanan's shop not only improved her family's financial situation but also became a symbol of empowerment for many women in the camp. Her success story is a powerful reminder of the impact of vocational training and the importance of supporting vulnerable populations.

Hanan's journey has inspired other women in the camp to pursue their aspirations, proving that with the right support and determination, barriers can be broken, and new paths can be forged.

Today, Hanan continues to thrive, her shop bustling with activity. She is not just a business owner but a role model, showing that women in the camps can achieve their dreams and contribute meaningfully to their community. Her story is a testament to the resilience and potential within every individual, waiting to be unlocked with the right opportunities
